Father Richard writes...

How far beyond our comfort zone are we prepared to go to sort things out? I look at many aspects of life, and it is clear that neither tinkering nor sticking to our guns and waiting for everything to come right are really very possible options. The survival of life on earth, say. We clearly cannot live as we do, and help others in the world and those who come after us to live the lifestyle we have come to expect if there is to be a future. A huge change in all we have come to expect and indeed all we have labelled as progress, will be required of us. It will be costly, uncomfortable if we are settled, and highly divisive. The same is true if the gifts of God are to be shared equitably. On a global scale, the vast outnumbering of those of us who have more than we need by those who do not have enough is a disgrace, and painful to anyone who follows the teaching of Jesus Christ. And it will be worse - as more of the processes of our economic and practical lives are delivered by Artificial Intelligence and automated systems, then the wealth it creates cannot be shared by the population, a growing number of whom simply won't have anything to do. Sharing out a diminishing demand for labour won't suit all, and the idea, ultimately probably inevitable, that the wealth creators will have to pay the living costs of all regardless of whether they work, is a really challenging brave new world. We have to explore what our deep core values are and prepare to make sacrifices to honour them. The only alternative is selfishness, greed, fighting our corner to keep the part we have. Attractive? Christian? I think not.

So how far beyond our comfort zone must we go?

What about the survival and flourishing of the church? I don't just mean here in Nettleham and Riseholme, though it is part of the bigger issue. Our diocese is at or very near the bottom of most league tables – fewer than 1.5% of our 1 million inhabitants go to church. At £7.20 per week on average, our regular church goers and givers are second to the lowest givers of all English Dioceses. And not because we are poor - we are actually bottom in terms of giving as a percentage of the county average income. 500 people leave our churches every year and are not replaced. So we have a challenge to turn the church round. No-one believes it will work unless it changes. Our increase in paid clergy has been a costly and only partly successful experiment in arresting decline by spending from our historic assets. We have subsidised our life as a diocese by using not just the receipts from our substantial assets (we are the richest diocese in capital assets, much of it farmland that brings a poor return) but by selling them. To the tune of £3m a year. The more we sell, the less interest and rent we get. We have borrowed from 2021 to make a balanced budget for 2020, and it just cannot go on. At the moment we have a cliff edge looming in January 2021.

Bishop David has taken on leadership at least for the time being, and is trying to confront this impossible-to-square circle. We need more mission and ministry or we will shrivel, but we need to spend less or give more.

Bishop David is working on this in a practical way which obviously is leading us to feel that the solution, like so many that face our world, is likely to mean sacrifice of some of what we hold dear. He is looking at five levers that will address the sustainability of the diocese – Increasing giving and share, better return on assets, lowering central service costs, streamlining clergy deployment and new mission to grow the church. Non-negotiable is the Christian faith, the making of disciples, the offering of worship, the living out of the way of life shown to us in Jesus, and the fight for justice and mercy. I think as Anglicans, we are not going to sacrifice the central beliefs and the sacraments of the catholic church. But 635 churches? A high percentage of the county's heritage? A church in every community, some of which are now tiny in terms of population? Paid clergy with all the leadership responsibility everywhere? Most worship on the day most families are stretched with sports, activities, travel to relations?

We are all going to be challenged to pray, think and talk about what are the nonnegotiables in change. We shall have to let go of some of our pet assumptions about church, just as we may have to let go of some of our lifestyle expectations to save the planet, and share our income, maybe uncomfortably, if all are to have enough. Find homes on the higher ground of the county for the thousands whose homes may well be inundated by 2050. Care for the millions displaced around the world.

Perhaps if we can learn to work sacrificially for the survival of the Christian faith, we shall ready ourselves and others for the sacrifices needed elsewhere. Maybe we might even be an example to others – I am sure that is what the Lord calls us to do. The church has adapted and changed to have survived and flourished up to now – it is only recently we have come to feel more like a bit of the heritage business. Just as life on earth has flourished through change – natural selection, extinction, new hybrids, new habitats.

The key essentials of being church are quite simple, and these are what we must defend. It would be tragic to lose our soul whilst attempting to keep our body comfortable.

Help for Fr Richard and Margaret!....

Understanding Eucharist: 1....

The Eucharist is the core of what the church offers to baptised Christians. Instituted by the Lord Jesus Christ himself, he took bread, blessed it, broke it and shared it; he took wine and blessed it and shared it. To his gathered apostles he said "this is my body" and "this is my blood". And he told them to "do it". The mainstream of the church has done it ever since. The gospels recount its inauguration. Especially in John, it is clearly what a very early church was doing all the time, and it is clearly the context in which Christians encountered the risen Lord. It is the regular rite that follows baptism in the early church as we see in Acts.

To most of us, meeting the Lord in the Eucharist is the centre, the heartbeat, the driver and the purpose of our faith. I personally don't see how a Christian wouldn't. Different names for this action show different emphases – *The Lord's Supper* emphasises the biblical origin and a sharing with Christ, a foretaste of the heavenly banquet. *Mass* emphasises the missional character of the rite and the action we are inspired and strengthened to take by our participation, using the Latin word for sending or mission which occurs in the final dismissal (spot the Latin root), *Ite missa est*, in the Roman and Lutheran versions. *Holy Communion* emphasises the sharing and the encounter – with each other and with the Lord. We tend to use the name *Eucharist* – from the Greek word eucharisto, which means thank you (try it in the Plough, but pronounce it efcharistō). Thus it offers back to God, in gratitude, all he has given us – the whole of his creation symbolised in the bread and the wine in their natural state, ourselves and our souls and bodies, and his love for us in giving us his son, offered to us and offered to God in the body and the blood which he told us "this is".

Over the next few weeks, we will explore the parts of the Eucharist, hoping to understand what we are doing and why we do it, and discovering why each bit is so important and so powerful.

A video I was watching recently said one of the most important parts of the Eucharist happens before the first words in our booklet. We come together. We gather. We who have been baptised, who have determined to be followers of Jesus, gather to meet him. We are pleased to see each other, of course, but in a way we could do that anywhere. When we come to the Eucharist, we share an excitement and anticipation – that through all we shall do together in the preparatory sections, in the hearing and responding to the word, and in the breaking and sharing of the bread and wine and eating and drinking the Lord's body and blood, we will meet the Lord and offer the ultimate worship of greeting, receiving and offering. So the fact we come at all and the way we prepare ourselves, in prayer, and focus, is a sign of our respect, and a means of preparing ourselves to listen, to adore, to pray, to receive and to offer to God.

That is why we generally try to have a few moments of silence before we start. It is why walking in and going to our places is what we all do, but is symbolically demonstrated and emphasised by the walking in of the ministers and those who will lead our worship.

All this leads into the words and actions of the first proper section of the Eucharist, called the Preparation – it contains a greeting, a reminder of the fact that we are baptised as members of Christ's body, the church, by the sign of the cross, a clearing of the rubbish by confession and absolution, the singing of the joyful statement of praise in the Gloria, and by hearing the collect, the prayer that focuses us on what we are specially hoping to hear and receive, and what we are offering, on this particular day. We will look at the preparation next week, and then the liturgy of the word, the liturgy of the body and blood and the sending out. And then the fellowship and the living out.

Ducklings news....

It is wonderful that our Ducklings are doing so well. Most weeks it is our best-attended event in church. Often around 70+ of you, sometimes more. Some of you are incredibly loyal.

One of the good things is we meet every week, come rain or shine. Holidays or term time. Our team of helpers is fabulous – getting chairs moved, safe floor coverings put down, toys and play equipment set out, and wonderful cakes and drinks. And then putting it all away again. Pauline does a great job coordinating it all. Several mums, dads and carers stay and help afterwards. It would probably be nice if there were a bit of a rota, so have a word with Pauline or Shirley if you'd like to help from time to time.

Christmas is a great time for tiny children. Christmas Eve is a Tuesday this year, and I'd love to give our main helpers a morning off. We thought we'd meet at 9.30 as usual but keep it a bit shorter. So we will have drinks and biscuits when you get there – please let your little ones dress up as a character from a nativity play! Doesn't matter if we have ten Mary's, fifteen angels and six donkeys. We will sing a song and act out a bit of the Bethlehem story. If you can't organise that or your little one is too shy, come anyway and watch. Then we will have some festive cake. We'd particularly like some definite extra helpers for this – our ministry team will run it.

Then we will all have a week off the Tuesday after Christmas.

After Christmas, we are looking at a time for a get together for people who've moved on from Ducklings to Nursery. Probably a social slot on a different morning or in the afternoo after nursery, at the Parish Centre for parents and carers. Talk to Father Richard or Shirley about that. We will miss you if you disappear completely.
