Father Richard writes...

I don't know how many of you are living your lives from day to day trying to ignore the noise of the election process, but incessantly taking a peep and getting variously depressed and angry. It is a surprisingly debilitating background noise. No-one lives entirely surrounded by people with whom they agree, and I guess there are political issues and choices which divide us more than usual at this time. I have lived and worked in the past in businesses or communities, even, I dare say, churches, where it never occurred to me that many people thought differently from me.

I reassure myself that most people who make up the community of which I am now a member at least agree on one thing – that whatever your party, whatever your voting intention, whatever your position on Brexit, the current choices are less than wonderful, candidates' conduct and inclination to attack people not their views are pretty unedifying, the political world and the reporting by the media are pretty horrible. We've allowed ourselves to become entrenched. The principal casualties of this political scene of the last couple of years have become civility and truth.

The back-drop to our own political horror story has been the awful spectacle of ruthless manipulation of truth and power in the USA, confused confrontation between ideologies and rights in Hong Kong, continuing atrocities in the Middle East, escalating tensions with a bear with wounded pride in Russia. A mindless move to populism and nationalism, similar to that which has plunged our world into hideous wars in the past, in places we thought were securely democratic and humane. And the disgraceful behaviour of senior members of our Royal Family and shocking and often unchallenged abuse in our churches, historic and more recent. An ecosystem descending into dysfunction, an escalating global population, destruction of habitats and thousands of species. Abject poverty and inhuman lifestyles around the world, even in places here.

All of this needs tackling, and I feel pretty forlorn in praying that there will come into positions of influence people who have a heart for healing and caring, and the skills to make them work. We need a national consensus, in fact a global consensus, to deal with much of this. I had a long conversation in the last couple of days thinking about how, if the economy grows, but fewer and fewer people are needed to work the machines and generate the wealth, the wages of all, sufficient to give them a decent life, might be paid. We are close to a world in which one business person could farm huge areas of Lincolnshire extremely productively, providing food for tens of thousands and making millions, entirely with machines run from his iPad. Who will be able to buy the food?

And so we have to vote - we must, as many women and men died so we can. I don't know what you think will make this world a better place. I am certainly not going to suggest how you should vote. I'll just pray for more Christ-like Christians in the world.

This is a great opportunity to do something for the community, to share love and joy at Christmas, to care for folk in our community, and to show what church-goers are made of. Please get in touch directly if you'd like to help, or donate. Entertainment? Presents? Baking and baked gifts? Carols? I went along last Christmas and it was a really great atmosphere.

Understanding Eucharist: 2....

Last week we thought about the Eucharist in general, and how just turning up and being ready is part of the joyful worship we offer to God in this regular service. Today, we think about the first part of the service itself, known as **The Gathering**.

Our standard service comes from Common Worship, Services and Prayers for the Church of England, published in 2000. Along with its supplementary books for the Times and Seasons, Festivals, Daily Prayer, Pastoral Services, Patterns of Worship and Christian Initiation and the historic Book of Common Prayer 1662, it is a rich and flexible resource and provides the only forms of service allowed by law in the Church of England. We use much more varied material from it than most churches. At its heart, in the main book, with forms of Eucharistic Worship and some seasonal material, Morning and Evening Prayer, collects and proper prayers for main Sundays and a modern version of the Psalms.

There is a list of the actions contained in a modern Eucharist (actually, though modern, it conforms more closely than BCP Holy Communion to the ancient norms of the Western Church). The Order Structure has three actions in *The Gathering*. It says:

The people and the priest

- Greet each other in the Lord's name
- Confess their sins and are assured of God's forgiveness
- Keep silence and pray a Collect

We begin our worship with a hymn in bigger services – a joint expression of joy helping to set the scene for the theme of the day – and an opportunity for the priest and ministers and servers to come in to emphasise this coming into church ready to meet the Lord in Word and Sacrament, and in each other. We open with the words with which we are baptised – In the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen. We are saying we are the church, the body of Christ, and that is why we are meeting. The greeting is then quite formal – and we should return it positively. Sometimes there is then an informal note of welcome, a seasonal greeting some information about the service.

We are then invited to make our confession in one or other of familiar forms. Repentance is an essential if we really believe we are to meet the Lord and offer God worship with a clean heart. Many people prepare privately what they really want to hold up before God. Nothing keeps us from the love of God and the table fellowship with the Lord Jesus as long as we acknowledge and confess our failings. We then hear from the priest the wonderful words totally assuring us of our forgiveness. At most times of the year, we say or sing a hymn of praise and thanksgiving – the Gloria.

The final section of The Gathering is the Collect. This is a special prayer for the day. Some of these are immensely ancient, all or beautiful and powerful. We always spend a little time in silence preparing to hear and pray the Collect. Silence is a really important part of our worship. We say Amen at the end. This can be a bit of a mumbled formality. Try listening really hard to the prayer, realising we are offering it to God the Father in the power of the Holy Spirit, and through what we have been given by Jesus Christ. Try saying Amen as a response to that awesome idea!

So now we are gathered and ready. Ready to meet the Lord in Holy Scripture, and then in the taking, breaking, blessing and sharing of the Bread. We will think about the encounter in the Word next week. Keep in mind that whilst the Eucharist is a great social function and a time of learning and deepening faith, it is primarily a time of encountering Jesus Christ, of offering to God all we have received, and being charged up to work for the Kingdom until the next time.

Parish Giving Scheme....

The large number of us who joined the Parish Giving Scheme are making a great contribution to the funds we need as a parish. Many of us who joined about the same time have recently received a message from the scheme managers in Gloucester (we pay nothing for the work they do for us). We have been told what a cost of living increase on our past year's contributions would look like. We can adjust our level of giving accordingly. Many of us round up a bit!

We have about 200 people connected with the church and coming to worship of various types, some very frequently and some more occasionally. Everyone who is coming to church on some level ought to think about being a regular giver. At present it is rather fewer than half! I do hope many more will think of joining the Parish Giving Scheme – you can get forms from me, from Russ Coulter or from the Parish Centre. It is a really easy way to give, and if you pay tax, we get some of that back as well. If you are using the scheme, please share with others how good it is to use. Let people know you use it – certainly don't say how much – even I am not allowed to know that! If you are a giver, please think about doing it through the Parish Giving Scheme. If you are in some way part of our wide All Saints Family and don't give regularly, please think about becoming a regular giver through the scheme. Even a few pounds a week paid monthly makes a huge difference. We give mainly for two reasons – because God expects generosity as a sign of our gratitude for all we have received, and because we want to enable the church, both here in Nettleham and across the county, to do its work, praising God, sharing the good news and transforming people and the world.

Our church and our diocese are in need of generous giving if we are to work for growth. The Church of England recommends 5% of net income. Our diocese has the lowest giving per regular giver anywhere in England, though Nettleham does a bit better than the average. However, if every regular of All Saints gave on average £5 per week more than now, we'd have an extra £60,000 a year. I've no idea if that is possible. That'd enable us to keep up with costs, extend our use of the Parish Centre, invest in music and in ministry with young people, help out some less fortunate parishes with their contribution to the wider church and give more generously to mission and needy causes. Smile please – the Lord loves a cheerful giver!
