## Bishop Nigel writes...

Back to school this week. We wish our local schoolchildren and students well at the start of the academic year. Especially those who have made significant transitions - from nursery to 'big school', from primary to secondary and on to post-16 education. University students will shortly be on their way. It is remarkable how much of British life is determined by the academic year. A hospital matron once told me the early days of the August rotation of trainee doctors to gain experience of different specialities was not ideal for patients admitted onto her wards (nor visiting chaplains).

We call these transitions *liminal*, deriving from the classical word for 'doorstep'. Popular culture imagined demons dwelt underneath, hence the tradition of a husband carrying the bride over the threshold of their marital home to ensure good luck. Entering a new building can indeed evoke joy or dread, curiosity or weariness in equal measure.

St Peter famously crossed the doorstep into the house of the Roman centurion Cornelius, bringing the Good News of Jesus into a Gentile household. Both Peter and Cornelius took a leap of faith which transformed them – a fundamental and dangerous threshold moment, shaping forever the history of the Christian Church beyond Jerusalem.

The Church always lives in a liminal moment. For its members, for curious seekers, for the ambivalent and adversarial. Despite the Christian Calendar beginning on Advent Sunday, parish churches enter a fresh term in September, full of energy and plans following the summer break. We can expect a busy time here in All Saints Nettleham, growing in faithful discipleship and community service, *living the liminal*.
