Lucille writes:

We are celebrating our Harvest Festivals. We live in an agricultural county known for its bountiful crops of potatoes, cereals fruit and vegetables. Traditionally this annual celebration of the harvest being gathered in and safely stored for the coming year would have been a very significant one. A good crop would have made the difference between feeding the family or starvation. We can imagine the relief felt by everyone that the barns were full and the celebrations and parties that accompanied harvest festival! As we walk around the village today, there are reminders outside many front gates of the bountiful harvest that is still being produced here. We can find apples, pears, courgettes, runner beans and many other types of fruit and vegetables being offered to passers-by for the taking. Welcome those these gifts are, we no longer rely on seasonal local produce. If our crops fail, or are poor, we may moan a little about prices going up, but we can still access all the food we need in the shops. To us then, Harvest Festival may no longer seem relevant.

It is time then to look at Harvest from a global perspective. I have done some research and found the following statistics: the world produces enough food to feed everyone on the planet. BUT, 733 million people world-wide experience hunger every day. Half of all child deaths are linked to malnutrition. The richest 1% own half the world's wealth.

This is shameful, but for us, as Christians, it is also an opportunity. It is a chance for us to show love to our fellow man by sharing God's bounty. For those of us who have plenty to eat on a daily basis there are plenty of charities who are working to feed the world's hungry that we can support. We have food banks in our village that make it easy for us to help others. So this Harvest Festival, let us determine to celebrate our harvest by sharing it with those in need.
